

## Deseret News/HarrisX State of the Working Class Survey

This survey was conducted online by HarrisX within the United States from April 18-24, 2023 among 2,178 adults. The sampling margin of error of this survey is plus or minus 2.1 percentage points. Results were weighted by gender by age, race/ethnicity, region, and income where necessary to align them with their actual proportions in the population.
